A word from the President.

As you may be aware, one our mission statements is: "To improve the quality of life of our members through the provision of continuing education in an inclusive, welcoming and nonthreatening environment to the satisfaction of our members."

To guide us all along the way and to help us achieve this objective we have the Hume U3A **Code of Conduct** which I would like to remind everyone about in this Newsletter.

The Code of Conduct gives the Committee of Management the responsibility and authority to advise and request changes in behaviour, or warn, and if necessary, following the Disputes and Grievances clause in the Constitution, to exclude a member from any or all courses or activities should inappropriate behaviour occur. As part of the Policy the Committee gives approval to a Tutor, to show and/or read the Code of Conduct, as a caution, to any member exhibiting inappropriate behaviour. Also, should the inappropriate behaviour continue, the Tutor has the authority to ask that member to leave the class or activity. That member must comply with that Tutor's request.

Inappropriate behaviour is defined within the Code of Conduct and I have included this as an attachment to this Newsletter (page 8) and suggest that you take the time to read it and familiarise yourself with what is *not allowed* within classes and activities.

All members have a right to feel safe and respected in a supportive and positive learning environment. We also have the right to make a complaint and receive a prompt and fair resolution. Along with these rights we have the responsibility to respect the beliefs, needs and background of other members and to maintain positive relationships in an inclusive environment.

The current **U3A Code of Conduct** is available on our website or if you require a hard copy then check with our office at the Gladstone Park Community Centre.

The Van Ross Hospital Saga

Last March I had a Laminectomy after back issues over Christmas/New Year period. To all intents the operation was successful BUT my mate Parky (I was diagnosed with Parkinson's in 2003) started to make his presence felt after staying in the background for a number of years.

I started to have a few falls and this irritated the right side of my leg with pain shooting through the right leg. I was readmitted on the 28 th August for treatment for pain and I was transferred to rehab for specific treatment.

Christine was scheduled to have her back done on 7th September (Laminectomy L6/5,L 3/4 L3/4 & L4/5 with fusion.) So there we were, both of us in Epworth Richmond Hospital which had not been planned for.

On Friday 6th September at 1.30pm I fell in my hospital room. Staff and my son Paul arrived a few moments later and following scans it was deemed I broke my left hip. Later at 10.30pm I was in the operating theatre for repair of my left hip and had a rod inserted in the left leg. Any movement of the left created a severe pain which was unbearable. The strange thing was, the pain in the right had gone.

Chris's operation was successful. My hip operation was successful and no pain was felt. We were both released from hospital on Sunday 6 October and we are doing our exercises and taking it easy.

Hope fully neither of us will need any further visits to any hospitals for a long time.




Seniors Card Off-peak Travel Vouchers



Extract from Hume U3A Code of Conduct

DEFINITION OF INAPPROPRIATE BEHAVIOUR

- 1. Any behaviour which breaches the rights, health or safety of other persons to participate in any group, class, course or activity organized by the U3A.
- 2. Failure to comply with a reasonable directive from any member of the committee, tutor or class leader.
- 3. Failure to comply with a directive relating to health or safety or other inappropriate behaviour.
- 4. Wilful or negligent damage to any property used by the U3A or the property of other persons involved in the U3A.
- 5. Any verbal or physical assault or attempted assault to any other member of the U3A.
- 6. Entering any property or location being used by the U3A when not entitled to do so.
- 7. Conduct which is disorderly, intimidating or which interferes with other persons of the U3A.
- 8. Conviction of a criminal offence committed which may be related to the U3A, its members, tutors, class leaders or Committee of Management.
- Any behaviour which, in the view of the Committee of Management, amounts to racism, sexual harassment, intimidation or discrimination, including on the basis of gender, race ethnic origin, disability, age, religious or political belief, marital status or parenthood.

- 10. Failure to comply with any request or warning about inappropriate behaviour related to the policy or procedure under this Code of Conduct.
- 11. This policy does not preclude the right or responsibility of any U3A member to bring exceptional inappropriate behaviour, especially relating to health and safety issues, directly to the attention of the police or other emergency services.
